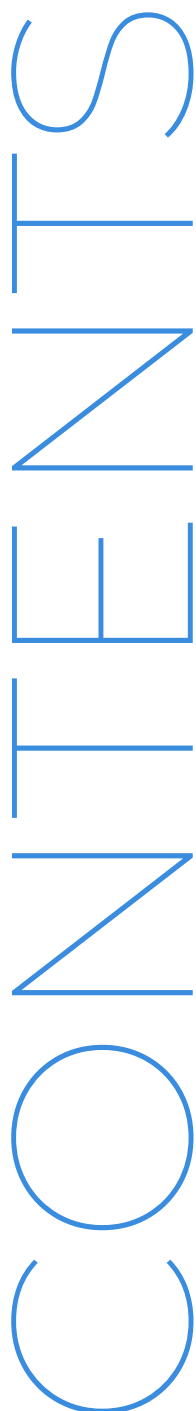

ABOUT WFM-IGP

Founded in 1947, the World Federalist Movement-Institute for Global Policy (WFM-IGP) is a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization. It is registered as a 501(c) (3) organization in the USA, and a Stichting in the Netherlands.

Our vision is a just, free, and peaceful world, where humanity and nature flourish in harmony. Our mission is to create more effective, transparent, and accountable global governance leading to democratic world federation.

OUR LEADERSHIP

EXECUTIVE BOARD CHAIR

The greatest challenge facing humanity is not climate change, war, or artificial intelligence. It is our failure to cooperate in addressing these issues.

That challenge is not new. It became impossible to ignore with the invention of nuclear weapons. For the first time, humanity possessed the power to destroy civilisation, making our capacity to cooperate a condition for our survival.

In response, world federalists from around the world came together in Montreux in 1947 to found the World Federalist Movement. They recognised that lasting peace, justice and human flourishing could not depend solely on relations between sovereign states, but required stronger international institutions founded on the rule of law and accountable to the people they serve.

History has repeatedly confirmed that founding insight. As humanity has become more interconnected, an increasing number of the challenges we face have outgrown national borders. They differ in form, but they share a common feature: no nation can solve them alone. Humanity's challenges have become global, yet political authority remains largely national.

Today, the pace of change is accelerating. Environmental tipping points are drawing closer, transformative technologies are advancing rapidly, and geopolitical tensions are growing. The cost of failing to cooperate is rising, while the window for shaping our future is narrowing. Change is coming, whether we like it or not. The question is whether we shape that change deliberately and democratically—or allow it to be driven by crisis.

There are reasons for optimism. As the limitations and inequities of today's international arrangements become more apparent, support is growing for global governance that is more effective, legitimate, democratic and just. Ideas once confined to the margins are increasingly entering mainstream political, scientific and public debate. The ideas that inspired WFM's founders are reaching more people than ever before.

That growing momentum was reflected in WFM's work throughout 2025. Our LAW not War programme advanced practical proposals to strengthen the International Court of Justice and promote the peaceful resolution of disputes through international law. MEGA (Mobilizing an Earth Governance Alliance) continued bringing together civil society, scientific expertise and international partners to strengthen governance of our shared planetary systems.

We also strengthened the movement itself. Two new Transnational Working Groups were established: one exploring how to build a mass movement for democratic world federation, and another developing WFM's educational resources and digital outreach. At our 2025 Congress, members adopted a Strategic Plan for 2026–2029. Building on WFM's long history of helping deliver reforms, including the creation of the International Criminal Court, and a more open selection process for the UN Secretary-General, the new strategy focuses on three mutually reinforcing priorities: strengthening our global network, deepening public understanding, and developing practical programmes. Together, these will increase WFM's capacity to help build the democratic world federation our founders envisaged.

OUR LEADERSHIP

None of this would have been possible without the extraordinary commitment of our member organizations, individual members, Board members, volunteers, consultants, donors and partners. Ours is a truly global movement built on the belief - and experience - that ordinary people can help shape extraordinary institutional change. I am deeply grateful to everyone who contributed their time, expertise and generosity throughout the year.

Nearly eighty years ago, our founders recognised that humanity had entered a new chapter of history. Today, that insight is resonating more widely than ever before. We believe the coming decade can be remembered not simply as a time of unprecedented global challenges, but as the moment humanity rose to those challenges by strengthening its capacity to cooperate. We are proud that WFM continues to lay the foundations for that future.

OUR LEADERSHIP

PROGRAM DIRECTOR

World Federalism envisages strong global governance to build international cooperation on critical issues for humanity and the planet, to resolve international conflicts peacefully, and to ensure compliance with international law.

The past two years have posed challenges to such global governance. We have seen a rise in authoritarian governments, including in powerful countries such as China, Russia and the United States, with a rise in aggression (war) and atrocity crimes (war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide), a withdrawal from key international treaties, and increasing challenges and direct attacks on global governance institutions such as the United Nations and the International Criminal Court. However, there has also been a contrasting development with a growing support for multilateralism from less powerful 'likeminded' states and in sectors of public opinion and media, with a number of positive developments.

There has been a significant increase in the use of international judicial institutions, for example, to help resolve conflicts and ensure accountability under international law.

This has resulted in more cases in front of the International Court of Justice than at any point in history. There has also been a significant increase in reference to the law in political processes at the UN General Assembly, with new initiatives to address violations of the law including the illegitimate use of veto power by P5 Members of the Security Council in cases of aggression and atrocity crimes. And the UN General Assembly succeeded in the 2024 Summit of the Future to build consensus from all UN Member States on the importance of multilateralism and international law, including in the digital environment and in protection of future generations.

Indeed, one could be mistaken in believing that Charles Dickens was predicting the times of the 2020s (not the 1850s) when he asserted that:

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of light, it was the season of darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair." (A Tale of Two Cities).

It is in such an environment that World Federalism is so important. We offer solutions to the world problems that cannot be resolved by nation states alone, and indeed are often caused by unrestrained power conflicts between nation states.

And we provide effective models for ensuring the global governance mechanisms are not top-down dominant structures, but are democratic, inclusive structures based on the notion of subsidiarity – i.e. that problems should be resolved at the lowest level of governance necessary for the task, from family, to community, to city, to national, to regional governance, with global mechanisms responsible only for decision-making and implementation that is required at the global level.

OUR LEADERSHIP

PROGRAM DIRECTOR

I believe that since I joined WFM just over two years ago, we have managed to enhance the visibility and role of WFM as an active and valuable player in key multilateral processes and forums, and in particular to elevate the ideals and visions of World Federalism and the many practical proposals and campaigns we develop to build better global governance. This is not the result primarily of my work as part-time Program Director. Indeed, WFM has only had funding for me to work less than one day per week (a few days per month).

But what I believe I have contributed has been to establish platforms, projects, materials and opportunities for WFM members to become more active and effective, and to assist with fundraising to ensure WFM sustainability.

I look forward to working with all WFM members - individual and organizations - to continue building the programs, visibility and impact of WFM over the next two years.

UPDATES

Executive Committee

In 2025, the Executive Board continued to play a central role in the governance of the organization, providing strategic oversight and supporting the implementation of key operational priorities. The Committee remained committed to fostering inclusive participation and effective decision-making across the organization.

Consistent with the meeting schedule adopted in previous years, Executive Board meetings were held every two months. A total of six meetings took place during the year. Between meetings, decisions, updates, and consultations were conducted via email, ensuring continuity in governance and timely responses to organizational needs. The Executive Board continued to benefit from the diverse perspectives and expertise of its members, representing different regions, generations, and professional backgrounds. This diversity remains a key strength in supporting the global mission and organizational cohesion of WFM-IGP.

A significant operational focus during 2025 was the modernization of the organization's information technology infrastructure. WFM-IGP engaged Jana Ware to lead its IT support and transition efforts, replacing the previous providers, Think4 and MediaBlend. While the transition process required substantial planning and coordination throughout the year, it positioned the organization to achieve greater efficiency, flexibility, and long-term cost savings.

During the year, WFM-IGP strengthened its capacity to support the MEGA program through the engagement of Sophie Rigg as a fundraising consultant. Reporting to the Program Director, Sophie was responsible for leading fundraising efforts for the MEGA program and providing additional support to program activities as needed. Working on a part-time basis throughout the year, her role focused on identifying funding opportunities, supporting donor engagement, and contributing to the long-term sustainability and growth of the program.

As part of this initiative, WFM-IGP undertook the transition from Microsoft services to Google for Nonprofits. By the end of 2025, the migration process was substantially complete, with the final transfer scheduled for January 2026. The move to Google for Nonprofits is expected to provide enhanced collaboration tools, simplified administration, and reduced technology costs. In addition, the organization gained greater internal control over email management and eliminated the annual maintenance fees previously associated with outsourced IT services.

The 30th Congress of the World Federalist Movement was held virtually on 1–2 November 2025, bringing together delegates and representatives from member organizations across all regions of the world. The Congress reviewed the organization's achievements and challenges since 2023, approved the Strategic Plan for 2026–2029, and adopted revisions to the Statutes aimed at improving the clarity and functionality of WFM-IGP's governance framework.

Congress ratified seven new Associate Member Organizations, reflecting the continued growth and diversity of the movement. Members also discussed key programmatic priorities, including Legal Alternatives to War (Law Not War), the Mobilizing Earth Governance Alliance (MEGA), the Coalition for the International Criminal Court (CICC), nuclear disarmament, and emerging work on global governance of artificial intelligence.

UPDATES

Executive Committee

An innovation introduced in 2025 was a keynote session on current developments in UN Charter reform, featuring Augusto Lopez-Claros and Heba Aly, together with a youth panel. Congress also approved a series of policy resolutions covering international justice, peace and human security, democratic global governance, and environmental governance. New Board members and committee members were elected and appointed, ensuring continuity while strengthening the intergenerational and global character of the organization.

Special recognition was given to long-serving leaders and contributors, including Co-President Fernando Iglesias and former Congress Chair Donna Park, whose dedication and leadership have made a significant contribution to the development of WFM-IGP. Discussions on the format of future Congresses emphasized the importance of balancing inclusivity, affordability, and opportunities for personal interaction, reaffirming WFM-IGP's commitment to maintaining a truly global and participatory movement.

Secretariat

In 2025, WFM-IGP maintained its decentralized Secretariat structure, with a team of consultants working remotely from different regions of the world. The Secretariat continued to support the organization's programs, communications, operations, fundraising, finance, and technology needs through a flexible and globally distributed model. The core team included:

The Secretariat's remote operating model continued to provide a cost-effective and flexible framework, enabling WFM-IGP to work efficiently across multiple regions while maintaining strong global connectivity and collaboration.

Office hosting agreements with Citizens for Global Solutions (Washington DC, USA) and WF Beweging Nederland (The Hague, Netherlands) were upheld throughout 2025, providing formal institutional presence in both North America and Europe.

The Secretariat's collaborative and global nature continues to be a strength, fostering inclusive communication and coordinated support across all areas of the organization's work.

Programs & Networks

As global challenges continue to evolve, WFM/IGP remains committed to strengthening its capacity to advance effective multilateralism, international justice, and democratic global governance. During 2025, the organization focused not only on advancing its programmatic priorities, but also on reinforcing its institutional foundations to ensure long-term sustainability and greater impact.

Building on previous years' efforts, WFM/IGP continued to strengthen its research, advocacy, strategic communications, and fundraising capacities while enhancing organizational systems, digital infrastructure, and operational effectiveness. These investments are intended to improve our ability to influence decision-makers, support our global membership, and position the organization to respond effectively to emerging opportunities and challenges in an increasingly complex international environment.

01

PEACE & INTERNATIONAL SECURITY

Through its peace and international security initiatives, WFM-IGP promotes international law, effective multilateralism, and common security approaches to prevent armed conflict, address global security challenges, and foster just, inclusive, and sustainable peace. Our programs support the implementation and strengthening of international legal frameworks and United Nations peace and security processes, while advancing human and environmental security. Throughout 2025, particular emphasis was placed on reinforcing the links between peace, human rights, climate resilience, and the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals as essential pillars of long-term global security.

ABOLISH WAR THROUGH COMMON SECURITY AND THE LAW PLATFORM

A. COMMON SECURITY PLATFORM

The platform includes an introduction to common security, an outline of key common security mechanisms and links to their founding documents, an explanation of the difference between common security and collective security, information on common security appeals/campaigns (including LAW not War) and a list of articles, videos and other resources on common security.

What is Common Security?

Common security is an approach to achieving national, regional and international security by taking into account the security needs of other nations - including one's adversaries - as well as one's own security needs. It is based on the assumption that sustainable security cannot be obtained by undermining or threatening the security of others, but rather on resolving conflicts with one's adversaries and ensuring that the security of all is upheld. Common Security relies on diplomacy, negotiation, mediation, arbitration and other forms of conflict resolution, as well as on the application of international law, to ensure peace, fairness and security for all. Common Security is a win-win approach to relations between countries (resolving issues so that everyone benefits) – rather than a win-lose approach (one country dominant over another) or a lose-lose approach (such as war). B. LEGAL ALTERNATIVES TO WAR (LAW not War)

LAW not War is a global campaign established by WFM-IGP to enhance the jurisdiction and use of the International Court of Justice (ICJ) in order to assist countries to resolve international disputes peacefully rather than through recourse to the threat or use of force.

The principal objective of the campaign is to increase the number of States accepting the compulsory jurisdiction of the ICJ, with the aspiration to achieve universal acceptance of jurisdiction by 2045, the 100th anniversary of the United Nations.

In addition, the campaign works to enhance ICJ jurisdiction through:

- Promoting greater use by UN bodies of the option to request Advisory Opinions from the ICJ;
- Encouraging disputing States to make more frequent use of the option of taking cases to the ICJ by mutual agreement;
- Encouraging more frequent use of the compulsory ICJ jurisdiction provision in a number of international treaties, and promoting the inclusion of compulsory ICJ jurisdiction in additional treaties;
- Encouraging states to adopt constitutional amendments or legislative measures to affirm the UN Charter prohibition of war and the obligation to resolve international disputes peacefully including through recourse to the ICJ.

The campaign employs a mixture of education about the value and impact of ICJ jurisdiction, and advocacy to enhance such jurisdiction.

Key Activities in 2025

Throughout 2025, the LAW not War campaign focused on strengthening advocacy, expanding partnerships, and preparing strategic engagement with governments and civil society. Key activities included:

- Updating the *ICJ and the Pacific Island States* non-paper and engaging regional partners in preparation for an online LAW not War briefing and future capital visits.
- Conducting advocacy during the Assembly of States Parties to the Rome Statute in The Hague through informal meetings with representatives of target countries.
- Promoting the campaign's objectives at the *Peace Palace Conference on Women and Peace in the Spirit of Bertha von Suttner*, co-sponsored by the Basel Peace Office.
- Meeting with the Global Challenges Foundation to review program implementation and prepare a funding renewal proposal.
- Preparing advocacy missions to Paris and Ljubljana through engagement with legal experts, civil society organizations, and government officials.
- Collaborating with organizations in the Netherlands to organize a public event marking the 30th anniversary of the ICJ Advisory Opinion on the Legality of the Threat or Use of Nuclear Weapons, highlighting the importance of the Court's advisory jurisdiction.

The LAW not War campaign reflects WFM-IGP's longstanding commitment to replacing the law of force with the force of law. By strengthening the role of the International Court of Justice, the campaign advances accountability under international law and reinforces peaceful mechanisms for resolving disputes between States.

02

SUSTAINABLE SECURITY WITHOUT NUCLEAR WEAPONS

WFM-IGP works to prevent nuclear war and advance a sustainable, secure, and nuclear-weapon-free world by promoting common security approaches, strengthening multilateral nuclear disarmament processes, supporting regional Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zones, and advocating for the reallocation of resources from nuclear weapons to peacebuilding, sustainable development, and climate action.

Coalition 3+3

Coalition 3+3 continues to advance the establishment of a North-East Asia Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone (NEA-NWFZ) as a practical common security framework to reduce the risk of nuclear conflict and promote regional nuclear disarmament. The proposed 3+3 Model envisions reciprocal commitments by Japan, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, and the Republic of Korea to renounce nuclear weapons and nuclear deterrence policies, alongside legally binding negative security assurances from China, the Russian Federation, and the United States not to threaten or use nuclear weapons against them.

The Coalition brings together parliamentarians, former government officials, policy experts, and civil society leaders from the six countries, together with international experts on nuclear-weapon-free zones, to advance dialogue and policy development on regional security and nuclear disarmament.

Key Activities in 2025

Throughout 2025, WFM-IGP continued to promote the Coalition 3+3 framework as an innovative common security approach to reducing nuclear risks in North-East Asia. The initiative remained an integral part of WFM-IGP's broader Common Security and Nuclear Disarmament programme, with continued advocacy highlighting the role of regional Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zones in strengthening international peace and security.

The Coalition also continued to build on discussions initiated during previous NPT meetings and international forums, fostering dialogue among policymakers, parliamentarians, and civil society representatives on practical pathways toward a North-East Asia Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone.

UNFOLD ZERO

UNFOLD ZERO advances United Nations initiatives and common security approaches to prevent nuclear war and achieve the global elimination of nuclear weapons. Established by WFM-IGP and seven partner international organizations, the platform promotes multilateral action on nuclear risk reduction and disarmament while advancing common security as a practical alternative to nuclear deterrence.

UNFOLD ZERO supports nuclear disarmament initiatives and processes across key United Nations bodies, including the General Assembly, Human Rights Council, Security Council, International Court of Justice, and the UN Secretariat, as well as the implementation of multilateral nuclear non-proliferation and disarmament treaties.

The platform also hosts the Common Security Depot, an online resource featuring publications, policy proposals, events, and practical approaches to common security.

The platform continued to publish its weekly UNFOLD ZERO E-Newsletter, reaching more than 4,500 subscribers with updates on United Nations initiatives, diplomatic developments, and civil society actions related to nuclear disarmament and international security.

COMMON SECURITY AND NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT

AWFM-IGP promotes nuclear disarmament through a Common Security approach, advocating for security policies based on international law, diplomacy, conflict prevention, and cooperation rather than nuclear deterrence. The program emphasizes that lasting security can only be achieved through peaceful conflict resolution, effective multilateralism, and full implementation of the United Nations Charter and international law.

In parallel, WFM-IGP works to reduce the political and economic drivers of the nuclear arms race through the Move the Nuclear Weapons Money campaign, which advocates for redirecting resources currently allocated to nuclear weapons toward peacebuilding, climate action, sustainable development, and human security.

Key Activities in 2025

Throughout 2025, WFM-IGP continued to promote common security and nuclear disarmament through advocacy, international dialogue, and engagement with multilateral processes. Key activities included:

- Organizing the side event Common Security and Nuclear Deterrence in a Turbulent World during the Preparatory Committee for the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT) at United Nations Headquarters in New York.
- Supporting dialogue on common security, global governance, and nuclear risk reduction through international conferences and public events.
- Continuing advocacy for the implementation of the nuclear disarmament commitments included in the Pact for the Future, adopted at the United Nations Summit of the Future.
- Promoting the establishment and strengthening of Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zones, including support for initiatives in North-East Asia, the Middle East, and Europe.
- Advancing the Move the Nuclear Weapons Money campaign by advocating for reductions in global nuclear weapons spending and increased investment in sustainable development, climate protection, and peacebuilding.
- Preparing and submitting a policy paper to the United Nations Office for Disarmament Affairs entitled The UN Pact for the Future: Nuclear Weapons Spending and the Sustainable Development Goals in a Turbulent World, highlighting the links between disarmament, sustainable development, and global security.

Through these activities, WFM-IGP continued to promote practical alternatives to nuclear deterrence while strengthening international cooperation, advancing common security, and supporting progress toward a world free of nuclear weapons.

03

REGIONAL GOVERNANCE

Effective global governance depends on strong regional and local institutions working in accordance with the principle of subsidiarity. WFM-IGP's regional governance initiatives seek to strengthen democratic institutions, the rule of law, and regional cooperation to address shared transnational challenges. During 2025, these initiatives focused on combating transnational organized crime, promoting accountability and anti-corruption, and advancing women's leadership and political participation. Key projects included:

CAMPAIGN FOR AN ANTI-CORRUPTION COURT

WFM-IGP partners with Citizens for Global Solutions and Integrity Initiatives International in the campaign for an International Anti-Corruption Court. This includes participation in IACC events and promotion of the Declaration in Support of the Creation of an International Anti-Corruption Court.

CAMPAIGN FOR A LATIN AMERICA AND CARIBBEAN CRIMINAL COURT AGAINST TRANSNATIONAL CRIME - COPLA

The Campaign for a Latin American and Caribbean Criminal Court Against Transnational Organized Crime (COPLA) seeks to strengthen regional cooperation and the rule of law by promoting the establishment of a regional judicial mechanism to address transnational organized crime. Launched in 2013 by Democracia Global, a member organization of WFM-IGP, the initiative responds to the growing regional nature of organized criminal networks, which increasingly operate across national borders and challenge the capacity of individual states to respond effectively.

The proposed Court is intended to complement, rather than replace, existing national justice systems by strengthening regional cooperation, supporting effective public policies, and enhancing the protection of fundamental rights, democracy, and the rule of law throughout Latin America and the Caribbean.

Key Activities in 2025

Throughout 2025, WFM-IGP continued to support the COPLA campaign through strategic partnerships, policy dialogue, and regional engagement aimed at strengthening cooperation against transnational organized crime.

Key activities included:

- Organizing the Third Italian–Argentine Anti-Mafia Seminar, held in March at the Chamber of Deputies of Argentina. The seminar brought together parliamentarians, legal experts, academics, and civil society representatives to exchange experiences and promote regional cooperation in combating organized crime.
- Supporting two Consensus Conferences held in November, one in Uruguay and one in Argentina, to advance dialogue on regional responses to transnational organized crime.
- Convening parliamentarians from Parlasur, prosecutors, legal experts, and government representatives to discuss enhanced cross-border judicial cooperation, technical assistance, and institutional strengthening as key elements in addressing organized crime across the region.

- Continuing to promote the establishment of COPLA as a complementary regional institution capable of strengthening justice systems, protecting human rights, and improving regional cooperation in the fight against transnational organized crime.

Through these activities, WFM-IGP continued to advance regional dialogue and build support for innovative institutional responses to one of the most significant governance and security challenges facing Latin America and the Caribbean.

ENVIRONMENTAL GOVERNANCE

Our Planet Earth is in an environmental crisis. Relying on the goodwill of nation states to implement environmental protection is ineffective and insufficient. Better global governance of the environment is required. Our current projects that seek to achieve this include:

MOBILIZING AN EARTH GOVERNANCE ALLIANCE (MEGA)

Mobilizing an Earth Governance Alliance (MEGA) is a coalition of civil society organizations working in partnership with like-minded governments and other stakeholders to strengthen global environmental governance. The initiative was jointly launched by WFM-IGP, the Climate Governance Commission, and Citizens for Global Solutions in March 2024 and continued to expand significantly throughout 2025.

MEGA seeks to advance more effective governance of the global environment by promoting institutional reforms, supporting multilateral cooperation, and facilitating collaboration among civil society organizations, policymakers, researchers, and other stakeholders. The initiative provides a platform for sharing resources, coordinating advocacy, and promoting practical proposals to address the planetary emergency.

Key Activities in 2025

Throughout 2025, MEGA continued to strengthen its global network and advocacy efforts. Major achievements included:

- Expanding the coalition to more than 130 participating organizations from around the world.
- Continuing to develop MEGA's online platform as a hub for information, advocacy resources, governance proposals, participating organizations, and opportunities for engagement.
- Participating in major international conferences and multilateral processes, including the UN Ocean Conference, the Plastics Treaty negotiations, the UN Climate Change Conferences (COP29), and London Climate Action Week.
- Promoting interfaith and civil society advocacy for stronger global environmental governance, including the endorsement and presentation of the appeal *Protecting Our Common Climate System: Earth Governance for a Sustainable Future* at COP29.
- Supporting the establishment and coordination of the ImPACT Coalition on Earth Governance, bringing together organizations committed to strengthening international environmental governance.

- Organizing and co-hosting a series of international in-person, hybrid, and online events addressing topics such as the rights of future generations, institutional representation for future generations, and opportunities arising from international court advisory opinions related to climate change.
- Contributing to expert consultations and strategic workshops convened by the Climate Governance Commission in Hamburg and Bellagio to develop priority proposals for strengthening global environmental governance.
- Publishing articles, policy updates, and briefing materials on key developments relating to Earth governance, climate governance, oceans, plastics, ecocide, and the protection of future generations.
- Expanding the MEGA online resource library and producing regular updates to inform participating organizations and partners of developments across the Earth governance agenda.
- Undertaking fundraising and donor engagement activities, including the preparation of concept papers, briefing documents, letters of inquiry, and funding proposals to foundations in support of MEGA's long-term sustainability.

Through these activities, MEGA continued to strengthen collaboration among civil society organizations and international partners while advancing practical proposals for more effective, inclusive, and accountable global environmental governance.

INTERNATIONAL COURT OF JUSTICE AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

The International Court of Justice is an important governance body available to ensure legal protection of the environment through the application of treaty-based and customary law. WFM highlights case history of the ICJ on environmental issues, e.g. the Nuclear Tests Case (1974), Legality of the Threat or Use of Nuclear Weapons case (1996), Gabčíkovo-Nagymaros Project/Hungary v Slovakia case (1997) Whaling in the Antarctic case (2014) and Costa Rica v. Nicaragua case (2018). We also engage in current environmental cases in the court, e.g. the ICJ Advisory Opinion on Climate Change. And we advocate for improved use of the ICJ for environmental cases such as including jurisdiction of the Court in global environmental agreements.

UN SUMMIT OF THE FUTURE/ ARTICLE 109 CONFERENCE

Reform to strengthen UN governance mechanisms is an important part of the work of WFM to build better global governance towards a democratic world federation. We have participated in the ImPACT Coalition on UN Charter Reform and consultations on a Second UN Charter. The ImPACT Coalition is now reframed as the Article 109 Coalition, based on Article 109 of the UN Charter which calls for a UN Charter Review Conference. The Article 109 Coalition was officially launched in New York on September 22, 2025. John Vlasto is WFM main representative to the Second UN Charter consultations and Article 109 coalition.

WFM-IGP also continued its engagement with the Coalition for the UN We Need, supporting civil society participation through regional and global consultations, contributing to the development of the People's Pact for the Future, and participating in the establishment of the ImPACT Coalitions.

Throughout 2025, WFM-IGP continued to build on the outcomes of the Summit of the Future by supporting implementation of the Pact for the Future through advocacy, partnerships, and active participation in the Coalition for the UN We Need and its ImPACT Coalitions. These efforts focused on translating the Summit's commitments into practical action, strengthening collaboration among civil society organizations, and advancing reforms to improve the effectiveness, accountability, and inclusiveness of global governance.

UN REFORM AND ARTICLE 109

Reform to strengthen UN governance mechanisms is an important part of the work of WFM to build better global governance towards a democratic world federation. We have participated in the ImPACT Coalition on UN Charter Reform and consultations on a Second UN Charter. The ImPACT Coalition is now reframed as the Article 109 Coalition, based on Article 109 of the UN Charter which calls for a UN Charter Review Conference. The Article109 Coalition was officially launched in New York on September 22, 2025. John Vlasto is WFM main representative to the Second UN Charter consultations and Article 109 coalition.

WFM-IGP works to strengthen democratic global governance by advancing practical and effective institutional reforms that promote peace, justice, human rights, environmental sustainability, and the rule of law. Through advocacy, policy development, and international partnerships, the organization supports concrete governance solutions that address today's global challenges while contributing to the long-term vision of a more peaceful, just, and cooperative international order.

1 FOR 8 BILLION

The post of United Nations Secretary-General (UNSG) is the world's most important job. From climate change to armed conflict, extremism to pandemics, many of the world's defining problems transcend borders and require global solutions which are forged at the UN and implemented under the leadership of the UNSG. We need the best possible person for the job: a highly-qualified and visionary leader, equipped to deal with the world's crises.

In 2014, WFM and the United Nations Association of the UK (UNA-UK) established and coordinated 1 for 7 Billion, a campaign involving over 750 participating organizations. The campaign succeeded in moving the UN General Assembly to make the selection process of the Secretary-General transparent and interactive for the first time ever. Candidates had to release their credentials and vision statements for the UN and participate in UNGA sessions where governments and civil society questioned them. WFM-IGP is now liaising with UNA-UK on the successor campaign 1 for 8 Billion.

The campaign has started preparing for the selection of the next UNSG which will take place in 2026. The new UNSG's term will start in 2027. With the world's population now just over 8 billion people, the campaign will probably be renamed 1 for 8 Billion.

INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL COURT

WFM was a co-founder and the inaugural host organization for the Coalition for an International Criminal Court, and continues to serve on the Steering Committee of the Coalition, represented by Rebecca Shoot, Executive Director of Citizens for Global Solutions. Rebecca also chairs the Washington DC Working Group on the International Criminal Court (WICC).

The Coalition succeeded in mobilising government support around the world for negotiations that established the International Criminal Court (ICC) through the adoption of the Rome Statute in 1998. The ICC provides an international court to ensure individual responsibility for war crimes, crimes against humanity, genocide and crimes against peace. The Coalition and its member organizations including WFM-IGC work in cooperation with like-minded governments and the ICC secretariat to employ the Court in appropriate circumstances, build further ratifications for the Rome Statute and strengthen the mandate of the Court including with regard to the crimes of aggression and the possibility of adding the crime of ecocide.

- Continuing collaboration with Coalition partners to promote implementation of the commitments contained in the Pact for the Future, particularly those relating to the strengthening of international judicial institutions and the peaceful settlement of disputes.
- Supporting ongoing dialogue among civil society organizations, legal experts, and policymakers on the role of international courts and tribunals in advancing international law, accountability, and global governance.

The Coalition remains an important platform for advancing WFM-IGP's long-standing commitment to strengthening the international rule of law and promoting effective, independent, and accessible international judicial institutions as essential pillars of a rules-based international order.

FUTURE GENERATIONS

WFM-IGP continues to promote the rights and wellbeing of future generations through its participation in the ImPACT Coalition on Future Generations, a global initiative chaired by the Office of the Future Generations Commissioner for Wales. The Coalition brings together governments, civil society organizations, and experts to advance institutional mechanisms that ensure the interests of future generations are represented in decision-making processes.

WFM-IGP supports advocacy and collaborative initiatives relating to the implementation of the Declaration on Future Generations, the establishment of a United Nations Envoy for Future Generations, and the creation of institutional representatives for future generations at the local, national, regional, and international levels. These priorities also complement the organization's work through the Mobilizing an Earth Governance Alliance (MEGA).

Key Activities in 2025

Throughout 2025, WFM-IGP continued to strengthen collaboration with the ImPACT Coalition on Future Generations through advocacy, knowledge-sharing, and participation in international events. Key activities included:

- Participating in the 2025 Future Generations Conference in Wales, contributing to discussions on institutional mechanisms to protect the interests of future generations.
- Facilitating the participation of representatives from the ImPACT Coalition on Future Generations in WFM-IGP events, fostering dialogue and collaboration across partner organizations.
- Promoting the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 and the work of the Future Generations Commissioner for Wales as leading examples of institutional representation for future generations.
- Supporting initiatives to encourage the establishment of future generations institutions at the local, regional, and national levels, including engagement with stakeholders in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.
- Continuing advocacy for stronger international governance mechanisms that embed long-term thinking and intergenerational responsibility within public decision-making.

Through these activities, WFM-IGP continued to advance practical models for institutional representation of future generations while strengthening international cooperation to ensure that future generations are meaningfully considered in governance, policy development, and sustainable development initiatives.

CAMPAIGN FOR A UN PARLIAMENTARY ASSEMBLY (UNPA)

For many years WFM/IGP has promoted and sponsored the creation of a Parliamentary Assembly alongside the General Assembly of the UN as the voice of “we the peoples of the United Nations” rather than just the states members. This has been ably pursued by Andreas Bummel, an active member of WFM/IGP and Democracy Without Borders. Democracy is the government of the people, by the people, for the people. Everybody who is affected by a decision of a public institution in a direct and fundamental way should have the opportunity to democratically participate in the decision-making process. According to the Universal Declaration on Human Rights and the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, democratic elections are the foundation of legitimate government authority. This right to democracy transcends national boundaries because in the era of globalization major public decisions are more and more being taken beyond the nation-state. Democracy Without Borders supports global democracy and a holistic approach to democratic promotion that spans from the local to the global levels and at the same time embraces the dimensions of representation, participation, deliberation and co-decision. A key objective is a Parliamentary Assembly at the UN.

STRENGTHENING INTERNATIONAL JUDICIAL INSTITUTIONS

The ImPACT Coalition on Strengthening International Judicial Institutions brings together civil society organizations committed to reinforcing the international rule of law by supporting existing judicial institutions, including the International Criminal Court (ICC), the International Court of Justice (ICJ), and the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (ITLOS), while also advocating for the establishment of additional international accountability mechanisms, such as an International Anti-Corruption Court and the proposed Treaty on Crimes Against Humanity.

WFM-IGP's Program Director continued to serve as a co-convenor of the Coalition, working in partnership with Rebecca Shoot and Neshan Gunasekera to advance collaborative advocacy and strengthen international judicial institutions. Through the Coalition, WFM-IGP contributed to advocacy efforts that supported the inclusion of commitments relating to international judicial institutions in the Pact for the Future, adopted at the United Nations Summit of the Future.

Key Activities in 2025

Building on the momentum generated by the Summit of the Future, the Coalition continued to convene dialogues and policy discussions aimed at strengthening international judicial cooperation and accountability. Activities included:

- Organizing the webinar Effective Approaches to Limit the P5 Use of the UN Security Council Veto Power, examining practical proposals to improve the effectiveness and accountability of the Security Council.
- Continuing collaboration with Coalition partners to promote implementation of the commitments contained in the Pact for the Future, particularly those relating to the strengthening of international judicial institutions and the peaceful settlement of disputes.

- Supporting ongoing dialogue among civil society organizations, legal experts, and policymakers on the role of international courts and tribunals in advancing international law, accountability, and global governance.

The Coalition remains an important platform for advancing WFM-IGP's long-standing commitment to strengthening the international rule of law and promoting effective, independent, and accessible international judicial institutions as essential pillars of a rules-based international order.

Throughout 2025, WFM-IGP continued to convene its three Transnational Working Groups on Artificial Intelligence; Values, Faith-Based Perspectives and Global Governance, and a World Security Community. Drawing on the expertise of WFM-IGP members and invited specialists from academia, international organizations, government, and civil society, the Working Groups provided a forum for dialogue, knowledge exchange, and policy development. Their discussions contributed to advancing practical proposals on emerging global governance challenges and strengthening international cooperation.

1. TRANSNATIONAL WORKING GROUP ON ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

The Transnational Working Group on AI and Disruptive Technologies (TWG on AI) was set up in 2019 to act as a focal point for WFM's engagement with the governance of AI and Disruptive Technologies, continued to serve as WFM-IGP's focal point for advancing the global governance of artificial intelligence. Meeting regularly throughout 2025, the Working Group brought together experts and WFM members to contribute to international policy discussions on the governance of AI, with a particular focus on ensuring that emerging technologies are developed and used in ways that are safe, inclusive, transparent, and consistent with human rights and democratic values.

The Working Group continued to engage with key international governance processes, including implementation of the Global Digital Compact and the development of the Global Dialogue on AI Governance under the United Nations. During 2025, the TWG submitted recommendations on the modalities of the Global Dialogue, advocating for stronger international cooperation and more effective global governance mechanisms for artificial intelligence.

The TWG also maintained its active participation in the ImPACT Coalition on AI and Cyber Technology, contributing to collaboration among civil society organizations working to strengthen international governance of AI and emerging technologies.

In Europe, the Working Group continued its engagement with the Council of Europe's Framework Convention on Artificial Intelligence, participating in expert consultations on the development of the Convention's HUDERIA methodology for assessing the impacts of AI systems on human rights, democracy, and the rule of law. WFM-IGP's contributions to this process were recognized and incorporated into the ongoing work of the Council of Europe.

Through these activities, the TWG continued to strengthen WFM-IGP's contribution to the development of effective, inclusive, and accountable global governance frameworks for artificial intelligence, while promoting international cooperation on one of the defining policy challenges of the twenty-first century.

2. TRANSNATIONAL WORKING GROUP ON COALITION FOR A WORLD SECURITY COMMUNITY OF DEMOCRATIC NATIONS

The CWSC is a transnational working group of the WFM-IGP in the area of peace and security. It is campaigning for the establishment of a World Security Community of democratic nations, an alliance of democracies with two major objectives: To assist in deterring China from invading Taiwan in the near term; To provide a nucleus for the evolution of a democratic world federation in the longer term. The purpose of the corporation shall be to promote world peace and effective global governance, particularly through the establishment of a World Security Community of democratic nations.

3. TRANSNATIONAL WORKING GROUP ON VALUES, FAITH-BASED PERSPECTIVES AND GLOBAL GOVERNANCE

Established in 2024, the Transnational Working Group on Values, Faith-Based Perspectives and Global Governance (Interfaith TWG) explores the connections between the principles of global governance, international law, and world federalism and the ethical values shared across religious, faith-based, and values-based traditions. Recognizing that the vast majority of the world's population identifies with a religious or values-based belief system, the Working Group seeks to demonstrate how principles such as justice, human dignity, stewardship, peace, solidarity, and our common humanity can support stronger systems of global governance.

The Working Group brings together individuals and organizations from diverse faith and values traditions to develop educational resources, organize advocacy initiatives, promote dialogue on WFM-IGP's priority issues, and encourage greater engagement with the global governance movement.

Key Activities in 2025

Throughout 2025, the Interfaith TWG continued to expand its engagement with faith-based communities and international partners through advocacy, dialogue, and collaborative initiatives. Key activities included:

- Continuing to promote the interfaith appeals Pursue Peace and Justice through Common Security, Not Nuclear Weapons and Protecting Our Common Climate System: Earth Governance for a Sustainable Future, strengthening collaboration between faith-based organizations and global governance advocates on issues of peace, nuclear disarmament, and climate governance.
- Organizing the online event Climate Protection, Faith and the Rights of Future Generations, which explored the role of faith communities and international law in advancing climate justice and the protection of future generations in the context of the International Court of Justice's Advisory Opinion on climate change.
- Convening the webinar Federalism, Faith and the Israel–Palestine Conflict, examining how federalist approaches could contribute to a just and sustainable resolution of the conflict.
- Contributing to the International Parliamentary Conference on Interfaith Dialogue, held at the Italian Parliament, where WFM-IGP presented on the role of parliamentarians, faith communities, and the United Nations Summit of the Future in advancing global governance and international cooperation.

- Continuing to expand the Working Group's network of members and partners, strengthening collaboration with faith-based organizations and values-based leaders committed to peace, justice, environmental stewardship, and effective global governance.

Through these activities, the Interfaith TWG continued to demonstrate the important role that faith-based and values-based perspectives can play in advancing international cooperation, strengthening multilateral institutions, and building public support for democratic global governance.

HIGHLIGHTS

Strategic Plan

In 2025, WFM-IGP adopted its Strategic Plan 2026–2029, designed to operationalize the organization's Theory of Change into a set of clear and measurable strategic objectives. The plan reaffirms WFM-IGP's vision of a just, free and peaceful world where humanity and nature flourish in harmony, and its mission to promote more effective, transparent and accountable global governance leading to democratic world federation.

The Strategic Plan identifies three mutually reinforcing areas of work: strengthening the global network of member organizations, educating the public and decision-makers on federalist ideas and global governance reforms, and advancing governance programs and projects aimed at building more democratic and accountable international institutions. It is grounded in the core values of integrity, inclusion, collaboration and focus, which guide the organization's activities and partnerships.

Through this framework, WFM-IGP seeks to connect its long-term vision with practical initiatives and measurable outcomes, ensuring greater coherence across programs and stronger engagement with member organizations and partners worldwide.

Individual giving program

In 2025, WFM-IGP continued to strengthen its culture of individual giving through the Individual Giving Program and the Spartans initiative. During our fundraising campaign, we once again reached out to our members, supporters and current donors for their invaluable support. We sincerely thank everyone who contributed or helped spread the word. Their commitment plays a vital role in sustaining our work, and we look forward to engaging our growing community of supporters in the initiatives and activities planned for 2026.

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANT'S REVIEW REPORT

To the Board of Directors of

Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

(1) Organization and nature of activities:

World Federalist Movement/Institute for Global Policy, Inc. (the "Organization") is a not-for-profit membership organization incorporated in 1995 pursuant to New York State Not-For-Profit Corporation law. The purpose of the Organization is to promote the federalist principles of constitutional democratic rule of law as the basis of relations between nations, as the framework for the international legal order, in the governance of the UN, and in the UN Charter goal to "save future generations from the scourge of war." The Organization undertakes research and education into issues concerned with history, promotion and development of international democracy and the rule of law and the strengthening of the legal order with a special focus on the United Nations. The Institute for Global Policy also serves as the Secretariat of the NGO Working Group on the Security Council. The following programs and supporting services are included in the accompanying financial statements:

International Democratic Governance ("IDG") -

Promotes greater transparency and accountability in international decision-making processes. Supports a stronger, more inclusive and effective United Nations, better global governance of environmental issues, as well as strengthened global economic governance. The IDG program produces news and analysis on these issues and manages civil society campaigns in support of widely-shared goals about better global solutions to pressing global problems, including the work of the Peacebuilding Commission ("PBC"), for 1 for 7 Billion Campaign on the selection of the UN Secretary General focusing on conflict prevention, disarmament (including nuclear disarmament), peacebuilding and the protection of civilians in the Sudan and Syria.

Administration -

Includes the functions necessary to maintain an equitable employment program; ensures an adequate working environment; provides coordination and articulation of the Organization's program strategy; secures proper administrative functioning of the Board of Directors; and manages the financial and budgetary responsibilities of the Organization.

Fundraising -

Provides the structure necessary to encourage and secure financial support from individuals, foundations, and governments.

(2) Summary of significant accounting policies:

The accompanying financial statements include the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of the Organization, which are presented under the accrual basis of accounting. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies followed by the Organization:

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation -

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of the Organization's programs, administration and fundraising. The Organization presents its financial statements in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"), which require the Organization's financial statements to distinguish net assets and changes in net assets between those with and without donor restrictions. The Organization's net assets consist of the following:

Without donor restrictions - net assets of the Organization which have not been restricted by an outside donor or by law and are therefore available for use in carrying out the operations of the Organization. Net assets without donor restrictions may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

With donor restrictions - net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity, but allows for the expenditure of net investment income and gains earned on the corpus for either specified or unspecified purposes. The Organization has elected to show restricted support for which restrictions are met in the same reporting period as support within net assets without donor restrictions.

Cash and cash equivalents -

All highly liquid investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less are considered to be cash equivalents for financial statement purposes.

Restricted cash -

Restricted cash as of December 31, 2025 relates to donor restricted funds of \$7,077.

Foreign currency translation -

Certain contributions and grants are derived from foreign sources. Such amounts are translated at the exchange rate in effect at the date the donation is received.

Revenue recognition -

The Organization complies with and accounts for its revenues in accordance with FASB ASC 958, *Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made*.

Revenue recognition (continued) -

The following are the significant revenue recognition accounting policies of the Organization:

Grants and contributions -

Grants and contributions are recognized as income when received and are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statements of Activities and Changes in Net Assets as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire in the reporting period in which the revenue is recognized. Conditional contributions are accounted for as a liability or are not recognized as revenue initially, until the barriers to entitlement are overcome, at which point a transaction is recognized as unconditional and classified as either net assets with donor restrictions, or net assets without donor restrictions.

Functional expenses -

Expenses are recognized when incurred. The Statements of Functional Expenses report certain categories of expenses that are attributable to one or more program or supporting functions of the Organization. Therefore, these expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. Direct program expenses are reported in their respective functional categories. All expenses are allocated on a systematic and rational basis.

Income taxes -

The Organization qualifies as a tax-exempt not-for-profit organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and applicable New York State tax laws. Accordingly, no provision for federal or state income taxes is required.

The Organization believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements.

Estimates -

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management of the Organization to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and the accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(3) Liquidity considerations:

Quantitative -

As of December 31, 2025, the Organization has \$96,942 of financial assets available to meet cash needs for program and supporting services expenditures within one year of the Statement of Financial Position date. None of the financial assets are subject to donor or other contractual restrictions that make them unavailable for expenditures within the ensuing fiscal year.

Qualitative -

As part of the Organization's liquidity management, it has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due. The Organization has a goal to maintain financial assets, which consist of cash and cash equivalents, on hand to meet 60 days of normal operating expenses, which are, on average, approximately \$60,000.

(4) Net assets

The Organization's net assets restricted for specific purposes at December 31, 2025 amounted to \$7,077 related to enabling the attendance of young members of WFA affiliates at international meetings.

(5) Commitments and contingencies:

Concentrations of credit risk -

The Organization maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts. The Organization believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

Consulting agreements -

The Organization has consulting agreements with individuals who provide program and supporting services. The Organization incurred \$35,700 and \$52,350 under these arrangements for the years ended December 31, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

Government contracts -

The Organization receives a substantial portion of its funding from contracts and grants, which are subject to audit by government agencies. Such audits may result in disallowances and a request for a return of funds.

(6) Subsequent events

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through June 10, 2026, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. There were no material subsequent events that required recognition or additional disclosure in the financial statements.

Consulting agreements -

The Organization has consulting agreements with individuals whom provide program and supporting services. The Organization incurred \$40,350 and \$90,880 under these arrangements for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Government contracts -

The Organization receives a substantial portion of its funding from contracts and grants which are subject to audit by government agencies. Such audits may result in disallowances and a request for a return of funds. During the years ended December 31, 2021, certain programs have been terminated leading to disallowances, which forced the Organization to refund the funds received. For the year ended December 31, 2024 and 2023 the Organization refunded \$0 and \$9,326, respectively.

(5) Subsequent events

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through May 27, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, noting no additional matters requiring consideration.
